I am opposed to EARLY DESEXING OF ANY ANIMAL.

All Desexing should be performed in consultation with a Vet

All Dogs that have NOT Been Approved or Assessed as being suitable for Breeding should be Desexed as soon a feasible and in consultation with a Vet.

EG 9-12 Months for Small Dogs & 12-24 Months for Larger Dog Breeds

7. Exemptions from mandatory de-sexing will apply for health and welfare reasons as assessed by a veterinarian, and if the dog owner is a registered breeder. Are there any other reasons why a dog should be exempt from being de-sexed?

All Desexing should be performed in consultation with a Vet

Any Dog Registered & Undertaking Dog Sport Activities should be exempt from Mandatory Desexing.

Working & Pastoral Dogs should be exempt where they are registered with the appropriate organisations for undertaking such activities.

### CONFIRMATION OF ONGOING PARTICIPATION MUST BE SUPPORTED BY EVIDENCE BASED DOCUMENTATION

REGISTRATION WITH DOGS WEST SHOULD NOT BE THE OVERRIDING BASIS FOR ANY EXEMPTION.

DOGS NEED TO BE ACTIVE & PARTICIPATING IN DOG SPORT ACTIVITY TO RETAIN ANY EXEMPTION. (REVIEWED YEARLY)

In order to be registered as a Breeder all dogs must be registered to the Owner where the Dog resides (Local Council & Sporting Organisation) & there must be an activity other than simple BREEDING involved.

No Breeder Licence should be granted where there is the sole activity of breeding involved. The activity other than the production of puppies.

# Membership of an Organisation should NOT be the sole determination for an Exemption.

The Breeding Animals Suitability on an Individual basis should be the overriding factor.

All dogs should be assessed & qualify to be deemed to be of breeding quality.

By a Veterinarian in the first instance followed by Organisational Support as to Breeding Quality for the Breed Involved.

An example. A Stud Book for all Dogs West Breeding Animals.

All dogs competing in Dog Sport Activity must be Vet checked & confirmed as suitable for breeding.

Must Maintain an Ongoing Participation in the Activity. (4 shows over a 12 month Period) & a least 1 Awarded Certificate (during lifetime & prior to Breeding) from a Qualified Judge which is obtained at a Sanctioned Show from Dog West or other affiliated ANKC Body.

Once a Dog has been awarded a Challenge Certificate an ongoing Veterinarian Certificate on suitability for breeding (yearly) is to be maintained.

After breeding activity is no longer viable a vet certificate of participation in dog sport activity is to be retained (yearly).

Once all Dog Sport activity is no longer viable a Vet Certificate on suitability fro desexing or otherwise obtained to determine exemption from requirement to desex.

ALL DESEXING SHOULD BE PERFORMED IN CONSULTATION WITH A VET.

The onus should be placed on those that want or desire an Exemption & the Organisation that supports their membership should have in place a system whereby the Criteria for meeting any exemption are responsible for maintaining Records in support of any Exemptions granted.

Such organisations can absorb or pass on their costs to their memberships seeking exemptions

Member of an Accredited Dog Sport Association or Pastoral/Working Dog Association

Must have greater involvement than a mere Registration Body

General Public have no interest nor Involvement in the Breeding of animals & unless participations in Dog Sport activity then there should be no objection to Mandatory Desexing at an appropriate time.

Outsourcing or Remote Housing of Breeding animals should be actively discouraged & Registered (Council) owner should be a full member of the Dog Sport Organisation to maintain any exemptions granted.

Otherwise the OWNER (Breeder) needs to maintain the animal at their premises or maintain FULL Ownership of the animal by Contractual agreement with the party who houses the Dog for council registration purposes.

Any such contractual agreements should be lodged with the Council where dog housed & Registered. Breeder takes Full Responsibility for compliance with the Dogs Council Registration & Obligations imposed as an owner under the Dog Act. The owner of the Property where the dog is housed takes similar responsibility for Registration & Care.

In effect the Dog becomes a Join Ownership between Property Owner & Breeder.

If Grant exemptions then strict adherence should be enforced.

Property Inspections should be mandatory & undertaken yearly (as a minimum).

Recognition of Organisations is an important aspect of control, BUT the Organisation must be held accountable IF it is to maintain an accreditation

Evidence will be required to be supplied to Local Council by the Organisation in order to maintain any Exemption.

Council may charge a fee for such Processing of such exemptions, which should be applicable to only those dogs that require an exemption.

Across the Board increase in Registration Fees are inappropriate & a burden on the general public that do not require exemptions.

As with the Requirement to complete an application for an Increase in the number of dogs held any exemptions can be treated in a similar fashion.

In recognition of Compliance with an Approved Organisations Rules & Regulations & Upholding a Code of Conduct a degree of relaxation in the Number of Dogs taht may be housed at any 1 property needs to be considered within the Dog Act..

For Example: Residential Property outside Kennel Zones with Block Size.

250-500sqm Maximum of 2 dogs allowed 500-750sqm Maximum of 3 Dogs 750-1000sqm Maximum of 4 Dogs

for every 500sqm thereafter an additional dog is permitted without a permit up to a maximum of 6 dogs without a Kennel Permit being applied for.

For any property where the owners are NOT members of an Approved Organisation then a limit of 2 Dogs without a permit should remain.

Permits for Non Members of an Approved Organisation may still be applied for.

Owner of Property continues to be bound by Local Council Bylaws in relation to Noise and/or Nuisance provisions.

Local Coucil cannot override ownewrship rights simple to deter numbers,

withiut valid & sustainable evidence to support a restriction on numbers.
